Nutt, S.T.L., S.T.D., is Provost of Ave Maria University. He holds graduate degrees from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas-Angelicum (Rome) and Franciscan University of Steubenville (OH). He joined the University in 2006 as a member of the theology department where he continues to serve as Associate Professor. He teaches the core curriculum course, THEO 205: Sacred Doctrine, and upper level undergraduate and graduate courses on the Sacraments and Christology. He co-directs the Aquinas Center for Theological Renewal with Dr. Michael Dauphinais and Dr. Steven Long, and is a member of the Academy of Catholic Theology.</p> <p>His research focuses on Christology and Sacramental Theology, and especially the Theology of St. Thomas Aquinas. He is the author of three books: Thomas Aquinas’ ‘<i>De Unione Verbi Incarnati</i>’ (Peeters Publishers, 2015); <i>General Principles of Sacramental Theology</i> (The Catholic University of America Press, 2017); and <i>To Die is Gain: A Theological (re-)Introduction to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick</i> for Clergy, Laity, Caregivers, and Everyone Else (Emmaus Academic, 2022). He has translated a number of works, his articles and book chapters have appeared in various publications, and he is co-editor of numerous volumes.</p> <p>In 2017, Dr. Nutt was appointed to the administration as Dean of Faculty and Vice President for Academic Affairs. In 2020 he was</p>

	appointed Provost. He also served as Interim President of Ave Maria University during the 2021-2022 academic year. Dr. Nutt and his wife, Susan, reside in the community of Ave Maria, FL, located near the University with their son, Timothy.
